

#### **Chairman's Report**

#### TWYNING PARISH ASSEMBLY 2022.

Welcome all to this Parish Assembly. Great to be able once more to meet face to face . Since our last report we have lost two more Councillors, both due to pressure of business. First Ray Edes and then Sarah Holden. Thank you Ray for long term of office, your constant contributions to meetings and service on our Green Committee. Thanks also to Sarah for her detailed service on the Minibus Committee and on the Village Hall Committee. We miss you both.

Following these resignations I am pleased to say we have co-opted Delta Ferguson and Alan Waldrop who have already settled in and are making excellent contributions to the wellbeing of the Village, supporting the Minibus, the Village Hall, the Emergency Committee to name but a few. We still have one vacancy on the Council and would like to hear from anyone interested in joining us using our power of co-option.

Many people and Organisations have given their all to get us through the Covid problems (although of course the problem still exists) to name a few (with profound apologies for any omissions) The Village Shop, our two Pubs, the Church, the Chapel. Our Borough and County Councillors, the Members of our Emergency Committee and of course you our Parishioners. Turning to Planning Matters and the "Siege of Twyning". Following the success with refusals by Tewkesbury Borough Planning Committee both the application for thirty homes for over 55's Opposite Cherry Orchard Lane and forty seven houses on Land North of Fleet Lane were allowed on appeal by Government Inspectors mainly due to the lack of Tewkesbury Borough's Housing Supply.

In the pipeline are several projects, the major ones being Fifty Houses at Hillend Road (also known as the Landslip and Nut Orchard), a large Distribution park at Brockeridge Paddocks (close to the Cattle Grid and and the proposal to use Twyning for the Processing Plant (including a Cement making Plant) and access to the Sand and Gravel Extraction in Worcestershire.

Looking at the Hillend Road application in more detail. Due to an alleged oversight by TBC Planners this has gone straight to Appeal and TBC are in effect now Consultees The Tewkesbury Borough Tree Officer proposed a Tree Preservation Order be made to protect the Two Thousand Trees planted about ten years ago and gifted to the Village. Tewkesbury Borough Council confirmed the making of this order, in respect of which no appeal has been made. The Parish Council applied to Register the Site as an Asset of Community Value which gives at the right to be informed if the site is up for sale and the right to make a bid to purchase it . Tewkesbury Borough accepted the registration. However the Owners have applied for a Review a hearing has taken place and as I type this report I have received notification that the Reviewer has decided the site should continue to be included in the Authorities List of Assets of Community Value. The Village first heard about the proposed site visit by members of TBC Planning Committee late on a Monday evening but due to excellent groundwork when the coach arrived at the site over One Hundred Villagers, many with dogs were waiting for them. Well done Twyning. We await the date for the hearing of the Appeal from the Planning Inspectorate. During our opposition to the Planning matters we have had support from interalia CPRE, volunteers distributing leaflets Stage Coach on rural congestion, Thank you all.

Moving on to a happier note. There has been real momentum with locally led sports clubs. On Kilmore Field we have seen:- Twyning Tigers with Fifty member aged between Three and Eleven who have played two matches already and practice nearly every Saturday morning not to mention the masses of Parents viewing A hardy grouping Rugby training every week. A positive increase in Tennis Club Members, with I understand improved success on Leagues. The opening up of the MUGA court and Court three.

I understand we expect to Welcome our first families from Ukraine shortly. We look forward to our well planned and advertised Jubilee celebrations and of course Twyning Fete on August Bank Holiday weekend. In conclusion I thank my Colleagues both past and present for all their knowledge, help and support while I have been Chairman. Also my thanks to our Clerk Gill Jennings for her guidance and expertise, to Dave Luckett for all he does for our Village to Bob Beetham for running the Footpath Gang and all those who support our Community , keeping themselves out of the headlights.

PS. As at 27th June the owners of the Hillend (Nut Orchard) Site are appealing to the Tribunal against the decision to list the woodland as a community asset and are appealing to the Planning Inspectorate re non-determination of their planning application. The Parish Council will continue to represent the community objections and keep you informed.

## **Community Bus Trial**

The trial community bus is once a week on a Wednesday and gives people a couple of hours in Tewkesbury. I have requested stops at Stratford Park, Twyning Manor and by Twyning Primary School. It collects at approximately 10.45am /11am (depending on your stop and other collections – you'll be given a time when you book), dropping people off near Boots, and returning from Tewkesbury at 1pm. It is a **book in advance only service** – you must ring up and book your seat by 12.30pm on the previous day (Tuesday). It works on a first come first served basis. There is a return charge of £4 for those with concessions (i.e. with a bus pass) and £8 without.

The number to call to book your seat is 01684 892 381 (9am-3.30pm Mon-Thursday, and 9am-12.30pm on Fridays). If Twyning would like a bus service, villagers will need to show evidence that they would use one, and this bus is a great way of doing this. For the trial to continue it needs supporting, so please make use of it. Cate Cody

## **Church Street Medical, Tewkesbury PPG**

#### Church Street Medical, Tewkesbury PPG

The patient Participation Group or PPG is small group of patients from the Practice who act as a conduit of information from the Practice to the patient and also in reverse from the medical staff to the patients. In addition we support the Practice in practical ways, for example assisting at our Covid vaccination clinics, Carers events and carrying out surveys on patients needs.

Every Medical Practice is required by law to support a PPG. Unfortunately, for various reasons this is not always the case and in the view of many it is a significant loss for both patients and medical staff. All of us are volunteers. We meet as a committee at least 4 times per year in our case at our Practice venue, the Devereux Centre, Barton Street, Tewkesbury. We are supported by Kirsty White , practice manager Andy Butt, financial manager, and prior to Covid by usually two GP partners. At a recent meeting questions were raised by the committee to how the Practice was responding to the additional pressures created by Covid and the time taken to see a GP. It was explained to us that it was not always in the best interests of the patient to see a GP and that it was possibly better to be treated by another healthcare professional. This is known as Care Navigation.

When a patient telephones Church Street with a request to see a doctor, the caller is transferred to a member of the care navigation team, who will ask the patient a few brief questions who will then signpost them to the most appropriate service. The Care Navigators are specially trained but are not replacements for medical staff. Their aim is to ensure patients get the right care, from the correct medical professional at the right time.

GP Practices are not just doctors and nurses, but a Clinical Team. These include GPs, Advanced Nurse Practitioners, Practice Nurses, Healthcare Assistants, Phlebotomists, Pharmacists, First Contact Practitioners, Social Prescribers, Community Paramedics etc. So don't worry if you are directed to a healthcare professional who is not a GP, you will receive the right care for your particular medical problem. Although Church Street has over 13,000 patients you will receive the very best treatment and help possible.

We had Easter crafts, a bouncy castle, sensory room, chill out zone for older children and teens, table tennis, pool, a baby and toddler corner, coffee shop and much more. It was highly successful and we are looking forward to our next one on 1st August. Our next Nuero diverse coffee morning runs at the chapel on Monday 20th June at 10 am and will be our last for the school year, so do pop along if you can. This facility will return in September.

Drama, creative writing, friendship group and Dinkies are all continuing to thrive at the chapel, and we have a few events happening from outside providers, such as a group for the local Ukranian community, and activities run by the Devereux Centre. Over the Jubilee weekend we were fortunate enough to be able to collaborate with St Mary Magdalene church, to run a beautiful traditional service on the green. This was very well attended.

I very much look forward to working with them again when we collectively undertake our end of summer picnic which will take place on 1st September. More details about this and the other upcoming events will be available soon. Our family services take place at 10.30am at the Chapel on Sunday mornings. We also hold a Zoom prayer meeting at 7pm on Tuesday evenings which I can provide the details for if you wish. Twyning Village Hall is run by a management committee consisting of Trustees (to the charity) and representatives from user groups. We meet one evening a month for a meeting that lasts about an hour.

We have a vacancy for a Trustee - a role which encompasses understanding how the charity functions and operates and manages its financial affairs. The committee is a democratic organisation and all members are involved in decision making. The role is not onerous but it is essential to good governance that the right balance of Trustees is maintained.

We also have a vacancy for a Booking Clerk. This is an essential role that ensures the day to day activities and private bookings are managed in an efficient manner. To do this we are in the process of adopting a software package called Hallmaster which not only manages the bookings, but also provides the facility to issue invoices. We need a person who is IT literate, numerate, has a working knowledge of Excel and a couple of free hours a week.

I should emphasise that the Hall cannot operate without a Booking Clerk, so it is important to the community that this role is filled by September 2022. Failure to fill this post will have serious consequences for the continued use of the hall.


