Chairman's Report

Welcome all to this edition of our Bulletin delivered by volunteers to every dwelling in the Parish. We also welcome Sarah Don-Bramah our new Editor and wish her every success in this task, in addition she has been appointed co-ordinator of the Parish Council website

We also welcome Cate Cody our newly elected County Councillor.

Assuming Covid matters progress as we hope we will again be holding Council meetings in the Village Hall. The Agenda for the next meeting will be available on the Council website.

John Irwin has tendered his resignation from the Council, and the Council is now in a position to Co-opt a new member to join us.

We await a date when the planning application to develop a site at Hillend Road (the Nut Orchard) will come before Tewkesbury Borough Council Planning Committee. It is of interest that to date there are just under two hundred and eighty objections including an objection from the Tewkesbury Borough Council Tree Officer. Thank you to all who have responded to this matter.

You will no doubt, shortly see new seats appearing on the Green and the Quay using Covid related grants.

During the Pandemic our Emergency, together with additional Volunteers, have been available to offer assistance when required however I am pleased to say that they have only been called upon on a few occasions clearly due to the great Community Spirit of Relatives, Friends and Neighbours, which clearly is a matter we can all be proud of. Well done all.

As the Council are not permitted to use reserves other than for Capital expenditure it was necessary to make a small monetary increase in your Council Tax to meet a rise in the cost of services.

In conclusion I wish to thank all those who have supported myself and the Council at a very difficult time, my Colleagues on the Council, John Irwin, our Clerk and RFO, the Footpath Gang, our Tree Warden, the Emergency Committee, the Minibus Committee, Kevin Cromwell, and our Borough Councillors.



It is an opportunity to meet others in the village, have a cuppa and a chat and trips out are arranged from time to time. One new development is our appointment of Emily and here are a few words from Emily who will explain her new role with us:

Twyning Playgroup

The past few months we've spent lots of time welcoming all the children back and welcoming new starters. It was so lovely in March to be able to have everyone back. We've boosted our numbers to 28 and have a waiting list for September. We do have some Pre school spaces left for a Tuesday if anyone is interested in putting their child's name down.

Now restrictions have started to ease the Pre School children have loved visiting school in small groups and making use of the newly refurbished outdoor area, the sand pit and large cuddly teddies all a big hit.

Helen has been running Forest School sessions down at Twyning Park. Thank you so much to the Simmons family for continuing to support Playgroup and having us back. One of our favourite activities has been using the clay to make sculptures. We also watered the village car park and drew around the shapes with chalk. We went down to Forest School and the children were encouraged to think about what might happen to our water whilst we were gone. The language from the children was fantastic.

When we got back all that was left was our colourful outlines of chalk. We had lots of questions and ideas such as the water drying, going down the drain and 1 child knew the term evaporated. A fantastic learning experience created by the staff but led by the children.

This term at Playgroup the children have been enjoying their role play. We had a few children talking about weddings and getting married and so we have had our very own wedding with accompanying music thanks to the large screen and projector. We also used the Projector to make a fruit order from Woody's where the children sat and chose their own favourites to add to the basket. When it arrived they used shopping baskets to carry it in and then practiced chopping the fruit.

We love being outdoors whatever the weather and have been watching our potatoes growing. Did you know that old strong cardboard boxes make great planters for potatoes and are very eco friendly. On the subject of eco friendly we also created our own glitter using salt and food colouring which of course is biodegradable, rather than using tiny shredded pieces of shiny plastic.

Staff have completed training on the New Early Years Framework which is coming into place from September. The New Framework focuses less on paperwork and on more quality interactions which we pride ourselves on doing anyway, but is great to know this will now be recognised by Ofsted.

We are looking forward to Sports Day, a summer outing and hopefully we will be able to invite parents to an end of year variety performance.

Twyning School

If I begin to tell you about all that has happened since I last wrote for the Bulletin, I might not be the editor's friend! Our relatively new Headteacher, Lucy Halling, has had to lead her team through the unique circumstances of the pandemic. Every effort was made to keep schooling going for the children of key workers and for the majority of children, who had to stay at home. Given the size and resources of a village school, I think most parents would agree that this task was met well. I obviously cannot comment on the sanity of parents and guardians!

The challenge of the pandemic is not behind us with the re-opening of school. The staff face the formidable task of assessing where the children are now in their educational journey. It is really important that the 'recovery plan' becomes just a natural part of their school day. The plan involves a careful look at each pupil and a strategy to get them back on track. This is all extra work for the staff, but they are certainly fully engaged with the challenge. As for the children, well their natural resilience is evident in the way they have settled back into school environment. If anything, staff report that their behaviour is better than pre-pandemic and that might reflect a maturing through the extraordinary experiences of the last year. Let us hope that it's a lasting silver lining.

Despite all the extra classroom tasks the staff have given of their own time to do some much-needed facelifting both to the interior and exterior of the School. As there has been limited access to the school building and surrounds much of this great work may have gone unnoticed. I hope it will not be long before you can see for yourself how much more care is going into making the school a welcoming place. Much more in terms of premises improvement is in the pipeline, including a full wall mural in the school hall reflecting Twyning and its environs. Rarely are these improvements covered by official funds , so we are grateful for any donations. Recently we have received generous support from the Village shop & the Parent-Teachers Association.

You will be pleased to hear that our school is popular and the planned intake for September is at the upper limit of our capacity. This brings significant challenges but also the benefits of extra funding and resources. Our aim is to provide places for all the children who want to come to us from Twyning. A good village school has much to offer and whilst space is at a premium there are clearly many other plusses which our parents and guardians recognise.

The governors and the staff look forward to Twyning School moving from strength to strength. If you want to know more visit our website which contains lots of interesting information. It too is having a major facelift!

There will be no charge for a period of 15 minutes either side of a booking to allow for setting up and clearing away.

This term we focused on the World Challenge badge and the impact we have on our environment. The badge work led to the chance of helping the community tackle the issue of dog fowling. The Cubs tied templates of dog faces on road signs and railing bars around the village to encourage people to clean up after their dogs. I am thankful to be supported by other section leaders in the Twyning Group, (Richard and Danielle Morley) who have made a commitment to Scouts, and two new members of the Twyning leadership team, Ben Wilson who has also kindly volunteered to get involved and Charlie Edwards who is one of our ex-Explorer Scouts.

We restarted with 8 Scouts, and with some of the older cubs moving up plus some recruitment following a 'virtual' bring a friend' evening, we are now standing at 14 members. The restrictions due to the Covid19 pandemicmeant that our programme was delivered via Zoom until Easter. In addition to games, quizzes, investing new Scouts, and working towards various badges, we did manage to have some fun outdoor activities, which were enjoyed as individual family groups, rather than all the `scouts together. Explorer Scouts





With our everchanging situation regarding Covid, Explorer Scouts did manage to have some, socially distanced, face to face activities outdoors, when the Tier status allowed. These included a navigation 'treasure hunt' on Bredon Hill, a Cluedo-based wide game and some target shooting and archery. Following that, there have been online quizzes and games plus some science and engineering talks. Since 'face to face' Scouting has been allowed again, after Easter, the Explorers have enjoyed more widegame challenges around Twyning, brushing up on their (socially distanced) First Aid skills, canoeing, climbing and getting back up to speed with their expedition skills, which will (all being well) culminate in walking and canoeing expeditions in Scotland during August. 
Bridge Club
