Beekeeping in Twyning

This year started out so well, with bees developing well and hives filling up with brood. The summer weather was great for a while, then the cold and wet spells meant much of the honey collected was eaten by the bees – as that is what it is for! We are likely to only get 1/3 of the honey we thought and that's disappointing for us, but at least the bees had a good year!

Training this year had to be put on hold for obvious reasons, and all those folk who signed up will be given a free course next year – subject to being able to run them. So for 2021 we are not able to offer new places, but instead we are planning on running a series of Taster Days. These will incorporate a morning session with theory and practical demonstrations on different hives and equipment, a picnic lunch, and in the afternoon a hands-on session with live bees so you get a chance to handle them and see how you like the craft. From here, if there is enough interest, we could start a limited weekly project to get you up and running with your own bees.

Acorns Children's Hospice

Well, as you will know, 2020 has been a difficult and somewhat traumatic year.

At the beginning of the year Sam and myself took the difficult decision that this would be the last year we would raise funds for Acorns by selling the knitted animals complete with creme eggs, he being in his 93rd year and me in my 82nd. We have competed 22 years selling Easter animals, first at the old Tewkesbury Hospital and then, when this was closed and knocked down, for Acorns.

Our team of knitters, stitchers and sellers has also gradually become depleted, due to age, infirmity and sadly death in some cases.

We thought – one last year, and let's make it a good one! Then Covid 19 struck – disaster! All our outlets in lockdown. Eventually, after many months, we managed to collect in the money and leftover animals with eggs. We were able to distribute some to Chance Street School (despite Easter having come and gone, we are sure the children appreciated them!) and also a huge number went to Acorns to be distributed to the families via food parcels.

At long last we have been able to collect all the tins and count the money. Many thanks to Louise at Tewkesbury Cards and Gifts, who was very grateful to take all the coins in exchange for notes, and we were then able to bank the money.

We now have a cheque for £1400 to be handed over to Acorns Children's Hospice, Worcester.

Finally, we would like to thank everyone who has helped in their own way to raise funds, first for Tewkesbury Hospital and then for Acorns. We shall miss you all, but hopefully we shall still see you around the village and also in and around Tewkesbury. Keep well and KEEP SAFE!

Twyning Chapel

Not much to report this time. During the last few months, we have met a couple of times on a Sunday morning via Zoom with services led by Steve Hutchinson from the Scripture Union which have been inspiring and lively (as usual!). As reported last time, many of us have continued watching services from other churches via Youtube, which we have enjoyed and found helpful.

However, we are really pleased to say that we have had a couple of outdoor services over recent weeks, in the garden at Croft Farm at Defford (thanks to Clive and Margaret Porter). We have been fortunate that the weather has been kind and we have not needed our umbrellas! It has been lovely to see and catch up face to face with each other – we even brought our own coffee/tea to share afterwards. We have also started having fortnightly Zoom prayer meetings as a way to meet and share together.

The chapel is ready to open safely for small numbers on a Sunday morning and we had hoped that this could have started in October, but will await further government guidance in light of the recent changes.

We continue to be thankful for our health and for living in a location which allows us to enjoy the lovely countryside and where numbers appear to have been relatively low. We hope and pray that we will soon be meeting up again and that some of our usual activities can re-start, but only when we can facilitate these safely and if these are allowed.

Twyning School

We should have a banner up that says 'Under New Management' but as most of you know, Lucy Halling has been Acting Headteacher since earlier in the year when Richard Vaughan left his post for medical reasons. It is good to report that Richard is now much better and looking ahead to taking up a new role in the near future. Covid 19 restrictions have made a farewell to Richard difficult but we hope to mark his significant contribution to Twyning School sometime during this term.

Lucy Halling has had a 'baptism of fire' as Acting Headteacher and now Headteacher in some of the most challenging circumstances imaginable. But in this short time, Lucy has managed to get more pupils into school than nearly all other comparable primary schools and the new term has opened well despite risk-assessments that would daunt lesser souls. Of course, she has not been alone in this endeavour and has been supported by the energy and professionalism of her staff. If you thought school staff took a long summer break, then think again! Even their partners were engaged in the many tasks it has taken to keep the doors open. The team is now joined by Mark Davies, our new and energetic Deputy Headteacher. There is a real drive and energy to ensure that Twyning School provides the best opportunity for its children, whatever the circumstances.

Given all the hard work to keep the School open, I was amazed that time could be found for other activities. But you may remember that we had to raise £4,000 towards the all-weather field surface. To this end, a fantastic fundraising effort has been going on during the summer, including a staff bike ride and lots of activities by the children. As I write this article, it looks as though £2,906 has been raised which is 72% of our £4,000 target. My thanks to all who have made this happen.

The governing body is now back up to full strength and has been kept busy during the appointment of new staff and arrangements for ongoing schooling. Can I thank Liz O'Dell who was my deputy and right-hand person until ill health forced her resignation in May. Since then, Carol Chapman has stepped into this role, bringing skills and energy which have been invaluable in keeping everything on track. Maggie Lewis has finished her term of office and Annie Siddall will leave us this term, both having made significant contributions to the School. Governors give their time freely to oversee and support education in the community. We welcome new governors David Henstock, Vicky Young, Oliver Last and Jamie Bartlam.

School is not just about reaching academic targets but an opportunity to develop well-rounded citizens. Covid 19 certainly has its downsides but it has also been an opportunity to focus on how the children relate to one another in their changed circumstances. I was delighted to note in last week's School Newsletter a special focus around the importance of 'good manners' around school. Well done to the staff for highlighting this lesson for life.

TRAC

A pocket history of TRAC

The idea to develop the site at Kilmore Lane as a sports facility was the vision of Mr Mike Warner and Mr David Stokes (PC Chair at the time). They put a commercial deal together whereupon Mr Warner gave the plot of land, with a car park and drainage, in return for Kilmore Lane being used for access to the new houses.

Mr Stokes set up TRAC (Twyning Recreation and Amenity Complex) as the body to run and raise money for the development. TRAC was opened in 1999 after much fundraising through Sport England and Lottery Funding.

A 28-year lease was drawn up allowing TRAC to use the site. The lease expires 2031

The objective of TRAC was to provide, manage and maintain recreational facilities for all age groups.

It was set up as a charity and is registered with the Charity Commission.

Over the years

- ♦ Many people/villagers have been members of its committee and all have given their time freely alongside their own busy work and family lives.
- TRAC has worked closely with Twyning Primary School to ensure the children of the village benefit as much as possible from the facilities on offer.
- ♦ TRAC works closely alongside Tennis Club as the major users of the site and has always included them in their fundraising ventures.
- The site has mainly been self-funding and the resident committees have worked hard to secure grants and funding as and when needed. Otherwise funding has come mainly from memberships and August Bank Holiday events, which of course include the annual village fete.

We have:

- Ensured the site is fully maintained
- Resurfaced the courts (twice)
- Installed a new perimeter fence to the play area
- Repaired, maintained and replaced equipment in the children's play area where needed

The committee worked extremely hard to secure 106 monies for the development of the top site, refurbishment of play area and resurfacing of the courts. We have an exciting 5-year plan (available on website) and wish the new committee the best of luck taking it forward and bringing those plans to fruition. Recently 106 money was obtained for extra changing facilities, within the vicinity of TRAC, and we already have instructed an architect to discuss extending the current pavilion.

There are too many people to thank individually who have helped make TRAC what it is today. The community are extremely lucky to have such fantastic facilities on their doorstep and ultimately our thanks should go to Mr Warner and Mr Stokes for having the idea it the first place.

As a community we need to come together and aim for the same thing... To provide the best possible recreational facilities we can for multi users of all ages.

We were hoping to move forward with the use of the Kilmore Field which as stated earlier, the 106 money enabled us to develop the top field for youth football, and we had many plans for more improvement, but have hit a few problems which I am not sure we can overcome, but be assured that TRAC committee are fully committed to continuing to provide play and sports facility for the village community.

TRAC

It has been quite a few disruptive months at TRAC. Not only have we all had to deal with the current pandemic but we have also had to deal with lot of discord between the Parish Council and TRAC. This ultimately led the TRAC committee proposing to dissolve TRAC completely and hand over the running of the site to the PC. I know that this decision was not taken lightly by the committee and we apologise profusely for the inconvenience that this caused to the community (especially the closure of the Play Area). But it seemed that whatever we said or proposed was just not being listened to or taken into consideration. We therefore notified the PC of our decision and all members were contacted, in line with our constitution, asking them to vote in favour of or against the proposal to dissolve.

However, during the requisite 21-day notice period, we were approached by many villagers who have been involved with TRAC over the past 21 years, urging us to find a way to avoid handing the site over to the PC and wanting us to continue running it in the way it was intended, for recreational purposes. After lots of consultations and discussions we are pleased to say that a new committee, as a charity, has been formed, and the need to dissolve avoided.

We appreciate all those who took the time to vote and understand that it might not have been the decision that some were hoping for, but as a resolution was found before the 21-day period ended we were able to withdraw the proposal.

We are so grateful to those who have volunteered to help take TRAC forward (some will have to wait just a little longer, as we are limited to the number we can co-opt outside of an AGM) and I hope they will get the support needed to continue to make TRAC successful.

It is a shame that the recent discord meant that some of those who were previously on the committee felt that they no longer wished to be involved, but we are grateful for all the time and effort that they have put into running TRAC over the years. We now have to ensure that their vision for the site is brought to fruition. We trust that the PC will continue to support the new committee and respect the decisions that they make.

Historically, TRAC has been a membership-only site and we understand that this has caused some discord within the village, as people thought it was elitist, so TRAC recently asked the PC to consider awarding them £3000 a year, so that need for memberships could be removed, making the site more accessible to all. (Currently the PC award TRAC £1000 annually: see previous page for a breakdown of PC contributions since 2016.)

Unfortunately, at a recent PC meeting the PC voted unanimously against extra annual funding and stated that they believed TRAC should be entirely self-funding, including the Play Area. We are one of the few villages in Gloucestershire whose playground is not fully run and maintained by their Parish Council and there is no income from the Play Area. Our income currently comes from grants, membership fees, court hire and the village fete (which of course was not held this year).

We worked hard to secure 106 monies, from the two developments within the village, and were given a substantial amount to create a football pitch on Kilmore Field for U13s football. However, since the area has been completed, the Parish Council have not agreed to give us a license for the top site, as they saw the opportunity to build a new childcare facility, with wrap around care, on the site. TRAC did not agree with the suggestion to build on the site as it would compromise the football field and more importantly, as a charity, we did not wish to be seen supporting a private venture; and so the discussions/disagreements commenced.

The PC now feel that the best location for the playgroup development is on the original TRAC site. An area of approx 235sqms, beyond the current pavilion has been identified, which would involve TRAC having to relinquish the lease for that area. We already have plans to build a third tennis court and this may inhibit those plans. Even though this new area has been identified, the PC continue to deny the lease for the top site. They don't want to run the football field, but perversely do not want TRAC to run it either.

In order for us to be self funding, as the PC suggest we should be, we were relying on income from the top site. We had hoped that any money generated, would go directly back into the whole site and help fund it going forward. WE HAVE NO HIDDEN AGENDA and without a lease for the top site it will be very difficult to cover all the costs.

We therefore need to ensure that we are able to utilise the facilities on offer as much as possible and encourage regular hire of the courts for multi sports. If anyone would like to run a regular activity from the courts, please do get in touch. The MUGA court is fully floodlit and indeed there are already plans for veteran football to run and hopefully netball will be able to return soon too.

It is going to be difficult time ahead for the new TRAC committee but hopefully everyone within the village and surrounding areas will support them in their venture

Ultimately all we want to do is to be able to provide the best possible recreational facilities we can for multi users, as was initially intended when the idea of TRAC first evolved.
