At the recent Parish Council meeting, it was agreed by Council members not to increase the Precept for this coming year.

Your Parish Council follows strictly the National Association of Local Council (NALC) guidelines. Full Council meetings and all committee meetings, where most decisions are made, are held in public, to be a completely open and transparent process.

You will have read quite a lot about \$106 monies in previous issues of the Bulletin. **WE HAVE GOOD NEWS**. The completion of both housing developments and the commencement of occupation triggers staged payments of the \$106 monies to fund the agreed schemes submitted by our working groups, in accordance with the laid down Tewkesbury Borough Council criteria. To achieve this marvellous \$106 success took many hours, by many dedicated people, over long periods of time: a truly magnificent piece of co-ordinated effort. On behalf of the Parish Council, I would like to take this opportunity in thanking all the people who were involved in the project, which is an enormous achievement.

Twyning Memories by 'A Villager'

Part 3 – Mine's a pint!

When we think of pubs in Twyning today we think of the Fleet, the Village Inn and the Crown at Shuthonger. There used to be many more.

The Fleet Inn is a large riverside inn which was owned by the Cheltenham and Hereford Brewery Company. The pub has stood on the banks of the River Avon for hundreds of years, serving river and road travellers. Oliver Cromwell's soldiers were known to sit by its inglenook fireplace while resting there, as the pub is located at a popular crossing point of the river. During WW2 it was popular with the American army personnel who were stationed in the area, the piano being played by Flo Handcliffe at all hours of the day and night. The cellars were full of spirits sent from Birmingham pubs. After the war Harold Nind, then Pete and Ida Bowring, great favourites of many villagers, ran the pub, serving ferry and river traffic as well as locals.

The Village Inn was a Flowers Brewery pub. The pre-war tenants were the Hopton family. Harry west followed, running the pub until the late 60s. He was a retired jockey, a suitable occupation for a landlord. There was a canopy across the front, a small bar and a bottle room. The skittle alley was around the back.

The Crown Inn at Shuthonger on the A38 was an Ind Co-op inn serving lorry drivers from Schofield's Transport Café as well as locals and tourists. The Wheldon family ran the pub until the early 1960s. The pub was known for its large amount of Aston Villa memorabilia, as well as England caps and medals, all of which were on show. The landlord's father was Villa captain at the time the original FA Cup was stolen.

Now on to pubs you may not know!

The Tiger stood alongside the A38 at Shuthonger and was owned by the Ramsey family. It was closed pre-war and became a transport café. The café was closed around 1946 due to the accidents which kept occurring at the bottom of the hill. The hill is still called Tiger's Pitch to this day. The premises became a dairy run by the Ramsey family, who had a milk round in the Twyning area.

The Thatch – the demise of this building makes me very sad. It was a beautiful black and white timbered building with a thatched roof and a brew house where they brewed their own beer. There was also a large wooden barn, and it stood just 100 yards off Hillend Road. At one time it was known as the Gardener's Arms. It was owned by the Darke family, who were an old Twyning family. The pub stood in around four acres of land and today would have been a listed building. It mysteriously burnt down in the late 1960s.

Dixy Land was named after the Dix family who owned the land at Hillend, where there were once pools that have now been filled in. You went to the door of the house for your drinks and then to the field at the rear of the property where seats had been placed. You could sit and watch the foxes playing in the manor fields. In the field was a lilac tree on which a dart board hung – the locals affectionately referred to this as the Lilac Lounge. It was a very popular place in the summer with the locals and their children. In winter customers went to the shed at the end of the house. As well as the pub, the Dix family also sold groceries, vegetables, paraffin, carbide, flowers and plants.

The Beer House was situated opposite the Fleet, where you cross over the stile into Twyning Park field. This was frequented by river traffic, and the stone breakers for the roads. It was reached by gangplanks when the floods were up. I do not know a great deal about it, except the little my great-grandfather told me about it.

Fundraising for Acorns Children's Hospice



Twyning Village Hall

A concerted effort by all the Village Hall (VH) Committee saw the usual publicity effort during the village fete. New members of the VH Lottery were recruited and the 'guess the number of Smarties in a gin bottle' was won with a guess of exactly the right number (499). We do rely on the lottery as a source of funding and would encourage anyone who wants to join in the fun to contact Maggie Ball.

We were pleased to welcome Dave Luckett who has joined the committee to become our new Chairman and he is already well into the job.

We intend to commission extensive works to improve conditions in the hall. There are 3 projects in hand to use money allocated to the VH via the S106 contributions (£9,846 in our case) made by the two developers. As a result, the internal heaters will be replaced with radiators, and a projector and drop-down screen will be bought, together with a replacement front gate. Additional work will be undertaken during the February half term, to replace much of the internal electrical systems including emergency lighting and the main hall lights. This will be paid for from VH funds. We will continue to improve conditions in the hall: a replacement cooker is under discussion, as is an urgent repair to the dishwasher.

We learnt about new styles of recording observations, and got ideas about how to reduce plastic toys, for example by using lots more natural items in our kitchen role-play rather than plastic food.

The children performed exceptionally in their nativity and we were very proud of them. Our nativity was based on children's current interests. Instead of 'going on a bear hunt, lion hunt, or dragon hunt', we went on a hunt to find the baby Jesus.

The children have been enjoying lots of outside learning at Forest School. We have been searching for bugs and going on a bear hunt using the nature around us. We have been looking at different holes and tracks to see which animal may have made them. We have been moving in different ways, rolling down hills and crawling under camo nets. We have been using firelighters and learning about fire safety. We loved having sparklers for firework night.

Numbers are nearly full at the moment, with a couple of new starters joining in February and April. We do have 1 space left on a Wednesday. Twyning Parish Community Minibus



The minibus is now in active use by residents of the Twyning Parish and is being regularly used by local organisations and resident outings. It is also proving very successful in providing transport to ten Hanley Castle students, taking them to and from school each day. All regular drivers have undertaken the nationally recommended MIDAS training and those transporting children and other vulnerable individuals have also undergone enhanced DBS checks.

The minibus working group meets up every few

weeks to ensure its smooth running and to discuss any outstanding items. Some time ago the staff and Governors had an aspiration to equip Twyning School with a suite of iPads. In today's financial climate it felt like a mountain to climb! However with a generous donation from Tewkesbury Rotary Club and magnificent fundraising by the PTFA and other school events the aspiration has been realised. It is important that our children are given the tools to prepare them for senior school and the world beyond. The staff will now have to teach pupils how to use this technology both creatively and responsibly. Pleased as we are to have these electronic aids to learning, I'd like to share with you a comment from our Ofsted Inspector who praised Twyning School for having so many books on display and the encouragement to read them. Thank you to all who make it possible for the school to give the broadest possible educational experience.

We might produce a rather dull bunch if it was all about ipads and books. So the headteacher, staff and governors are always looking for ways to open up and sharpen up all the ways that our children will experience their world. If you gave some money at Christmas to the Twyning Carol Singers you will have contributed to the £650 we are receiving towards a Secret Garden. This is a project which cannot move forward without local funding. A big thank you to all who went out on some pretty cold December evenings. You are not only maintaining a traditional activity, but your efforts will help us stimulate an interest in horticulture which may have a long-term impact. Every child can benefit from time out in a garden. The project is yet to be realised and if you have ideas or practical skills which could help us please let me know.

Lest you think we are pleased with ourselves for what has been achieved over the last year the Governors are launching a 2019 campaign to raise £10,000 for the improvement of the playground and outdoor areas so that the children can spend time more productively out of doors. This will include extending the grassed play area; updating and extending the playground markings; providing new, permanent outdoor play and gym equipment and providing tables and chairs for lunchtime and breaks. Governors will be approaching local businesses to form partnerships. If you feel you can help in any way, please let us know!

In my view educational statistics are for educational nerds and they will never be short of employment. But that said, I do take note when I read that Twyning School is well above average when it comes to Attainment: 79% as against 64% nationally, which means that locally only Ashchurch did better! TRAC

At the time of writing this bulletin we have exciting times ahead for TRAC.

\$106 monies

We know there have been a lot of 'Chinese whispers' within the village and on Facebook about the allocation of the 106 monies to Twyning, but the facts are that the distribution of 106 monies is controlled by deeds agreed between Tewkesbury Borough Council and The Developers with specific criteria having to be met by those applying. The money was not guaranteed to come to Twyning.

The TRAC committee have worked extremely hard over the past 18 months to ensure that Twyning benefitted as much as possible from the money on offer.

The main areas/criteria of how the money was to be allocated were: (P=Persimmon contribution N= Newlands contribution)

P1 – Playing pitches – 'towards the cost of providing playing pitches within the vicinity of the site' P2 – Village Hall/TRAC – 'towards the improvement of the village hall or provision of TRAC facilities' P3 – Astroturf – 'for the provision of Astroturf at Tewkesbury Sports Centre or resurfacing on the MUGA at the TRAC facility'

N1 – Play Facilities – 'towards the cost of providing and/or improving play facilities/equipment which can be securely sited and utilised by young people for recreational purposes'

N2 – Astroturf – 'towards the provision of off-site sports Astroturf'

 $\rm N3$ – Twyning Village Hall/TRAC – 'towards the provision of funds for the facilities at the Twyning Village Hall /TRAC facility'

However the 106 money is calculated, the sum on offer, under each title, was predetermined and TRAC had to apply, along with all other interested parties, in the hope that our bids were successful. Which we are pleased to report they were!

Under the playing pitches category TRAC put in a bid to secure money for the development of the top site at TRAC. For a long time people have been asking for a suitable area to play football in the village and although we did attempt to cut the area, the ground was too uneven to play safely upon. We have now instructed a contractor (who lives in the village) to flatten the area and prepare it so that five-a -side football can be played on it. We have also worked closely with the school to ensure that they are able to utilise the site as much as possible: the area will also be marked out with 10 x10 grids for multi use by the children. There will even be a small running track marked out. We have plans to install outdoor multi gym equipment stations and also hopefully a small area for a BMX bike course, to ensure that this is contained in a specific area. Hopefully through these plans we have accommodated a lot of different needs within the village.

Also under this category we have instructed contractors to resurface the two tennis courts and the MUGA court. We are so lucky to have a thriving Tennis Club in the village and the courts are used regularly, but they are in dire need of resurfacing. Hopefully by improving the facilities even more people will use them. With the money allocated to TRAC for 'play facilities' we are looking to have the play area equipment refurbished: although our play area is one of the best locally, in parts it is in much need of a facelift. Due to new regulations we would have to redesign the whole area if we wanted to replace the equipment, which would be outside our budget, but within guidelines we are able to refurbish with 'like for like'!

Any other monies will be used to improve the site once these projects are complete, providing more seating, tables, bins etc. All the work is due to start in the Spring and will be carried out with as little disruption to users as possible.

It is appreciated that our proposed improvements won't be how everyone hoped that the 106 money would be used and some may feel aggrieved that other areas are not benefitting from the 106 money but the TRAC application was made with the best intentions of ensuring that the village community benefitted and the final say was made by the Borough Council, so we hope you will support TRAC in the decisions that we have made.

No footpath

There have also been a lot of rumours that there will be a footpath from the new Persimmon site through TRAC to the village, however this is not the case. Not only would this have safeguarding implications for children using the play area, but it would also not be possible to have a path straight across a football pitch. Under our constitution TRAC needs to ensure that the site is locked in hours of darkness, so an open footpath would not be permissible. I understand from the Parish Council that now that the pavement has been widened and pedestrian access has been provided from the Persimmon site to the village, there are no plans to provide another path. If you have any further queries, please approach the PC.

Ongoing funding / membership

Most play areas in our neighbourhood are paid for and run by their local Parish Councils but this is not the case in Twyning. TRAC is run by a very small committee of willing volunteers who are prepared to do all they can to provide a fantastic facility for the whole of our community. TRAC is a non-profit-making charity and all our funds come through our court membership fees, the Village Fete and grants (which are scarce). So obviously we are really grateful to have been awarded this 106 money and we ask that, once the work is complete, you support us as much as possible and try to use the fantastic facilities that will be on offer by becoming a member at TRAC. Annual membership costs just £12.50 (less than 3.5p a day) a year for an adult member or £5.00 (less than 1.5p a day) for a child under 16. Once we have these facilities we need to have support from people who are able to run a football club or other sport activities on the site, so please make contact with us to ensure that there is a thriving sporting future for the youth and all in the village to benefit from these improvements. Diseases are a major problem these days, as are poisoning from pesticides and agro-chemicals. So we bee keepers need to be vigilant and treat our bees to keep them happy and productive. The Herbert Protocol for dementia


Don't wait until your loved one goes missing...

Are you looking after someone with dementia, and have concerns about what will happen if they go missing? The individual may look to return to a memorable place or location. Disorientation and confusion may quickly follow, making them extremely vulnerable, and it is vital for searching officers to locate them quickly.

You can help by signing up to the Herbert Protocol on their behalf (see box below), filling in significant details on a simple form which is retained just in case there is a time when they go missing. The form includes things like previous addresses and special locations, such as a family grave, which may be a draw to them; hobbies and regular routines; photos and an up to date description – sometimes hard to recall in the panic of finding that your loved one has gone missing.

Gloucestershire Constabulary is working with the Alzheimer's Society to promote this scheme, named after war veteran George Herbert who died whilst missing and trying to return to his childhood home.

Editor's note: I have repeatedly asked the Communications Officer at Gloucestershire Constabulary for alternative contact details for those who do not use the internet. None have been forthcoming although they 'appreciate my concerns' on the matter! Their stance is 'You can ask someone to do this for you' – my stance is 'Why should you have to?'!
